K-Kids Week is the second full week of February

Your K-Kids club can participate in a week designated to shine a light on the impact you're making in your communities. Follow a special theme each day during the week to build awareness and engage new members. We've developed an easy-to-use toolkit to help you make the most of K-Kids Week.

The toolkit includes:

A media release and letter to the editor explaining K-Kids and highlighting your owr club's service projects. Media pitches inviting reporters to cover events also are included.
Graphics and suggested social media posts for your K-Kids and your Kiwanis club to share on Facebook, Twitter and Instagram.
Proclamations by city, county and state government boards and commissions.

Local service club allows elementary school students to contribute to community

YOUR CITY, STATE (Date) – K-Kids Week, February _____, recognizes elementary school students who join to help their community. K-Kids – a Kiwanis International program – provides an opportunity for members to develop initiative and leadership skills through service.

The K-Kids of NAME is participating by LIST ANY SERVICE PROJECTS OR OBSERVATIONS/CELEBRATIONS. This week, the K-Kids of NAME will meet at TIME, DATE, PLACE to NAME PROJECT OR EVENT. IDENTIFY ANY PARTNERS THAT WILL PARTICIPATE WITH YOUR K-KIDS CLUB.

"In NAME OF COMMUNITY, we believe it's important to give elementary school students the opportunity to give back to their community, to participate in service and to have time together in an atmosphere that allows fellowship and fun," said NAME, K-Kids advisor.

IF THE CLUB HELPED A FOOD BANK COLLECT, PREPARE OR DISTRIBUTE FOOD, ASK A REPRESENTATIVE TO INCLUDE A QUOTE ABOUT HOW THE KIDS HELPED THE PEOPLE THEY SERVE.

The K-Kids program began in 2000. Today, more than 1,100 clubs further the Kiwanis International mission of serving the children of the world.

Every year, Kiwanis club members around the world donate a combined 7 million hours of volunteer service. Clubs often provide help in communities where budgets have been cut or social services have been reduced. Each Kiwanis club determines the best way to meet the needs of the community. Some give students backpacks with school supplies; others provide gifts and meals during the holidays or organize bike and swimming safety lessons. To provide these services, clubs raise funds through a wide range of activities ranging from selling peanuts and holding pancake breakfasts to sponsoring car washes and dances.

Kiwanis clubs partner with youth leadership programs, including K-Kids for elementary school students, Builders Club for middle school students, Key Club International for high school students and Circle K International for college students, as well as the adult service leadership program Aktion Club for adults with disabilities to make their communities a better place to live and work. In addition to the K-Kids Club, The Kiwanis Club of NAME sponsors LIST KEY CLUB OR BUILDERS CLUB PROGRAMS.

SOCIAL MEDIA

Let your club and community know what K-Kids is and what it's doing. Use the daily theme information and graphics at www.k-kids.org/k-kidsweek to create social media posts.

Examples:

Monday: Show your K-Kids pride—tell everyone you know about K-Kids by spreading the word about it. It's easy! Wear your official member pin, host a party with free food for other students to come and learn more about your club, or print and pass out K-Kids

stickers! You can event make a video, song, or posters about K-Kids beforehand to share on this day!

Tuesday: **Kudos to the helpers**—Personally thank all the K-Kids supporters you know—teachers, principals, advisors, community leaders, Kiwanians, parents and others. Make thank-you cards or crafts, write thank-you notes, host an appreciation party, deliver a special song or performance, or do something uniquely your own style to recognize people's contributions.

Wednesday: **Share with parents and families**—Share K-Kids and your passion for serving others with your biggest cheerleaders—your parents! Host a show-and-tell party to show off the club's work, make a special presentation, invite local organizations your club has helped to speak on your club's impact, or invite the sponsoring Kiwanis club to share the mission of Kiwanis and your club's impact.

Thursday: **Random acts of kindness**—A smile goes a long way. Spread happiness throughout your school by doing little random acts of kindness — such as holding the door open for someone, putting change in a vending machine, doing a chore around the house or leaving a nice note in a library book. Challenge every member to complete at least one random act of kindness.

Friday: Connect the Kiwanis family—K-Kids is the largest elementary school service organization in the world, and it's the newest program in the Kiwanis family. Celebrate the entire family of Kiwanis by engaging with all local Kiwanis family clubs - Builders Club, Key Club, Circle K, Aktion Club and Kiwanis. Ask your sponsoring Kiwanis club to present on the Kiwanis family, host a service project and invite other Kiwanis family clubs to participate. Or ask to make a presentation about your K-Kids club's work at a Kiwanis family club's upcoming meeting.

PROCLAMATIONS

Many governing bodies, such as town boards, city councils, county boards of supervisors or commissioners, set aside time during meetings to issue proclamations. Mayors and city or town supervisors also issue proclamations. Most ask the requesting organization to provide a template with specific information.

Call your mayor's office or local governing board to determine whether they can issue a proclamation (and how much advance time is needed). In both your request and the proclamation, itself, note any projects the club has performed with or for the city or county. Use the template below, modifying as necessary, to highlight your club's projects and events.

Invite members of your K-Kids and sponsoring Kiwanis club, along with any partners, to the meeting at which the proclamation will be given. You also can notify media about the photo opportunity; include information about past or future service projects or events that are worthy of coverage. Make sure your club takes photos and shares them on social media and your website.
